Albert Kahn's world

Born in Alsace in 1860, Albert Kahn arrived in Paris in 1876. After he made his fortune very quickly, he founded his own bank in 1898. Wanting to put his wealth towards his different projects for the advancement of progress and peace, he created the Archives de la Planète: more than 72,000 color photographs (autochromes) and 180 km of silent, black-and-white film, taken between 1909 and 1931, a part of which can be found in this room.



The Archives de la Planète

The autochrome

Invented by the Lumière brothers in 1903, the autochrome was the first technical process used in color photography. A rather unusual technique, it uses potato starch tinted in three colors: orange, green and violet.

The Vosges Barn

Before entering the forests, first head towards the Vosges barn. The harmonious cohabitation of plants from various locations symbolizes Albert Kahn's ideal world: borders do not exist in the garden. Without the work of the gardeners, this garden would have disappeared. Thanks to more than 2,500 autochromes depicting the garden between 1910 and 1931, they were able to conserve its original spirit.
